I finally managed to photograph one of my house guest skinks – it was cooperative enough to stay on the mulch for me! I've not managed to identify it.



Visiting at STEP, this fungus was impossible to miss. There were masses like this around the base of every *Eucalyptus nortonii* I could see along the contour. Andy Russell identified it as Spectacular Rustgill – *Gymnopilus junonius*. The caps reach a fairly spectacular size as they age! Andy says this is the second year they've grown here.

It's Gang-gang time again

In recent times there have been concerns about how the Gang-gang would survive after all the environmental disasters. So I am delighted to report that about 25 of them are visiting us as usual on our bush block on the eastern edge of Queanbeyan. It is so nice to hear their squeaking and wheezing calls and to see all the leaves and new shoots they regularly prune from the top of large gum trees. Noticing the eucalyptus smell from the debris on the ground means to look up to see Gang-gangs in the tree tops.

I said visiting us as usual because my records going back to 1995 show that Gang-gangs are regularly here at this time of year. Often a few hanging around, but sometimes a flock of 20 or more and over 40 in 1998 for example. Similarly we get flocks of Yellow-faced Honeyeaters passing through, maybe the odd White-naped Honeyeater with them.

There have been some changes in timing (climate change ?) but it is uncanny how often birds return at just the same time. We usually have a pair of Scarlet Robins staying around for the Winter and they arrived back right on time on 5 April. On the other hand Friars have formed little flocks and gone north.

Everyone will have noticed the profusion of blossoms on Eucalypts this year.

We have had flocks of very noisy feasting Rainbow Lorikeets. We also had two Musk Lorikeets feeding with the Rainbows, the first time we have recorded them here. The yellow flash on their side stands out.

More Gang gangs

Colin has noted the annual sightings of Gang Gangs at his property. It's known that these are now an endangered species.

This month I had my brother visit from Queensland so I took him out to nearby Shepherds Lookout. We were delighted to see around four Gang Gangs: two immature males, a female and an unidentified fourth bird.

My brother was quite chuffed as he had not seen a Gang Gang previously, however, I was quite disappointed as meeting a couple of guys there, they said we had just missed a pair of Wedge-tailed Eagles flying very close overhead.

Looking at Canberra Nature Map, Gang Gangs have been reported at Shepherds Lookout previously but I think these must be historical COG records as I couldn't find any recent reports with photos so I was quite happy to get some lovely photos.


