Intriguing links between the birds of New Guinea and Australia

Speaker: Leo Joseph

Leo Joseph has been watching and studying Australian birds since he was but a lad growing up in Adelaide. Joining the South Australian Ornithological Association in 1971 marked a point of no return because it was then that he started meeting other, like-minded people and travelling around the countryside looking at birds. He very early became interested in evolution and how it has been that the different birds in Australia have come to be distributed the way they are across the landscape. This interest along with reading the works of Canberra ornithologists Dick Schodde and Joe Forshaw alerted him to the importance of knowing and understanding something of the birds of New Guinea if you really wanted to understand the birds of Australia, and vice versa. So, many years later, after living and working in Uruguay in South America and Philadelphia in the USA, Leo returned to Australia in 2005 and has started to include New Guinean birds in his research and in his birdwatching activities. IN the talk, he will try and convey something of the intriguing links between the birds of the two areas and will touch on logrunners, sooty owls, honeyeaters, parrots and others. He is currently setting up field work in the savannas of southern Papua New Guinea.

Black Mountain wildflower ramble




