# MEETING—Thursday 2 December 2021 Christmas catch-up

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### October observations

October has been an interesting time as I emerged from lockdown and was able to leave the local region to visit Campbell Park and find the rare Red-backed

Kingfisher patiently hanging around until every birdo in the ACT managed to get a glimpse, and better yet, a photo.

While there, in one large tree I found nesting Nankeen Kestrels, Corellas,



Cockatoos, Rainbow Lorikeets and Starlings. I also found the now infamous, Owlet Nightjar and a Shining Bronze Cuckoo.

Orchids have been superb this year. The Spider Orchids I found at Gossan Hill last year have had a bumper year. Across the road at Bruce Ridge, I've possibly found nesting Gang Gangs. They've been at the same hollow on a couple of follow-up visits.

Closer to home I've gotten back into the Pinnacle Reserve a number of times and found a number of newly recorded insect species for the reserve to the delight of the reserve's keeper of records.

There is also a lot of nesting happening. Normally I rely on John, who does regular surveys at the reserve, to let me know of nesting activity. This season I seem to be ahead of him finding nesting Satin Bowerbirds, Magpie Larks, Willie Wagtails, Spotted and Striated Pardalotes and Buff-rumped Thornbills.

I caught up with John and Barbara last Sunday as they were doing their annual BirdBlitz. I was alledgedly there to look for flowering Sun orchids but joined them for their survey. This was very beneficial.

We heard Sacred Kingfishers in the distance near the woodland and I was lucky enough to actually see the pair today along the boundary track. We also found five other Sacred Kingfishers in two groups.

John led us to a family of Tawny Frogmouths in the Weetangera paddock, who had two chicks in a nest. Mum was sitting nearby.

I'd heard a report of another baby Frogmouth further west, and as luck have it, we met a woman who also told us about this with good directions on how to find the family. Again, a family with two chicks sitting with dad, and mum sitting on a branch just below.



Earlier, hearing a Kookaburra giving a low strangulated call, I paused to listen more closely and we then observed a bird bringing a lizard to a nest nearby.



Other highlights were a Satin Flycatcher and in the Weetangera paddock we flushed a Brown Quail.

My more recent trips to the reserve are partly due to helping out with a Superb Parrot survey. From this I've found a pair of nesting Kestrels regularly hunting in the paddocks along the back of Hawker as well as a pair of Black-shouldered Kites.

After several unsuccessful trip, I finally found the Sun Orchids in flower.



A great season that can hopefully, only get better.

# Sunday 5 December, 9.30 am – Property on the Yaouk Road on the south-western edge of Namadgi National Park: Return: 5.30 pm or earlier as desired

This trip is to visit Janet Stein's property just south of Namadgi National Park. Carpooling is recommended. Meet at the carpark next to the public toilets in Tharwa on the left, just after crossing the bridge over the Murrumbidgee River. Bring lunch and drinks, hats and sturdy shoes or boots. Janet will boil the billy and make tea and coffee. There are no shops or facilities so please bring everything you need for a day in the bush. The property is 65 km from Tharwa via Naas / Boboyan and Yaouk Roads, including 34 km of gravel road that is generally in very good condition and suitable for 2wd vehicles (just take it slowly over the occasional pothole or cattle grid). Activities will be flexible depending on members' interests. Options to explore sub-alpine grassy woodlands, forests and wetlands and the ongoing recovery and regeneration following the Black Summer bushfires and subsequent erosion events. Note that mobile phone coverage is very limited. Weak coverage available only on the very highest points on the property, very patchy on the Boboyan Road.

### Who are the Field Naturalists?


